



From the Pastor's Desk:

"You are dust and to dust you shall return."

Last night was Ash Wednesday. As I marked twenty-four foreheads, I repeated the same phrase..."You are dust and to dust you shall return." I used to be afraid of death. I used to wonder if my life was lived in vain. Have I done all the right things? Said all the right prayers? But as I listened to Bishop Tim's sermon to rostered leaders during one of four Chrism Masses, he helped me realize I have been thinking about the wrong things and asking the wrong questions!!

In baptism, we die to self and are raised to new life...a new life in Jesus Christ...the one and only person who has defeated death. And in rising to a new life in Christ, we are now free to live...live the life we have been called to live.

During Lent, our Sunday worship services will explore the theme God on the Move. God incarnate in Jesus did not stay in one place for long. His earthly ministry was one of moving from one place and encounter to the next. He also moved through every part of the human experience, encountering everything from temptation, to joy, to suffering, and even death. This series help us reclaim the movement of Jesus' ministry from temptation to condemnation, through his teaching and miracles and finally through the story of his death and resurrection. As we encounter the life and ministry of Jesus, we cannot stay the same. Our lives should be changed. We ourselves are moved to grow and change as followers and imitators of the gospel.

Lent provides us the opportunity to delve deeper into our own self-examination and take time to sit with the God who has moved in our own lives. Now that we are free to live the life we were created to live in and through the baptismal waters, we can ponder how we are never alone. God has been and is still on the move in our own lives. God walks with us as we walk our own Lenten journey of self-discovery and self-reflection of what it means to be a child of God. And God walks with us every step as we travel the road to Easter!

"We are dust and to dust we shall return." Now let's freely live as people of God.



Historical Roots of Lent in Lutheran Tradition

Lutherans around the world observe the solemn season of Lent, a period of 40 days leading up to Easter. During this time, believers reflect on Jesus Christ's sacrifice and prepare their hearts for the joyous celebration of his resurrection. Understanding the historical roots of Lent in the Lutheran tradition allows us to appreciate the significance and practices associated with this sacred season.

- 1. Origins in the Ancient Church: Lent originated in the early centuries of the Christian Church as a time for new converts to prepare for baptism. It soon became a season of spiritual renewal for all believers. The word "Lent" itself is derived from the Anglo-Saxon word "lencten," meaning spring, symbolizing the spiritual rebirth and growth that takes place during this time.
- 2. Length of the Lenten Season: Just as Jesus spent 40 days in the wilderness, Lent spans a period of 40 days, excluding Sundays. This number holds deep biblical sig nificance, representing trials, testing, and purification. It serves as a reminder of the Israelites' 40 years in the desert and Jesus' 40 days of fasting and temptation.
- 3. Fasting and Abstinence: Fasting and abstinence are central practices during Lent. Lutherans traditionally observe fasting on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, while abstaining from meat on Fridays throughout the season. These practices serve as a reminder to turn our focus away from worldly distractions and towards God, fostering spiritual discipline and self-reflection.
- 4. Prayer and Devotion: Lent is a time for heightened prayer and devotion, providing an opportunity to draw closer to God and seek His guidance in our lives. Many Luther ans participate in daily devotions, meditation, and attending special prayer services. The use of prayer beads, such as the Rosary, can also be a helpful tool in focused meditation and contemplation.
- 5. Almsgiving and Service: Lent encourages believers to act as Christ's hands and feet by engaging in acts of charity and service to others. Lutherans embrace this tradition by dedicating themselves to helping those in need through fundraisers, volunteering, or donating to charitable causes. This expression of love and compassion embodies the teachings of Jesus and fosters a spirit of humility and servant-heartedness.

By understanding the historical roots of Lent in the Lutheran tradition, we gain a deeper appreciation for its purpose and practices. This season serves as a time of reflection, repentance, and spiritual growth, as we prepare our hearts to celebrate the resurrection of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. May Lent be a transformative journey for all who partake in its observance, drawing us closer to God and strengthening our faith.

What is Shrove Tuesday?

- 1) Shrove Tuesday is a Christian festival celebrated in many countries across the globe. It falls on the Tuesday before the beginning of Lent a period of around six weeks leading up to Easter. During Lent, Christians give up luxuries to remember when Jesus went into the desert for 40 days to fast and pray.
- 2) The exact date of Shrove Tuesday changes from year to year. But one thing stays the same it's always 47 days before Easter Sunday. And yes, you guessed it, it's always on a Tuesday!
- 3) The name comes from the old word 'shriving', which means to listen to someone's sins and forgive them. In <u>Anglo-Saxon England</u>, Christians would go to church on Shrove Tuesday to confess their sins and clean their soul. In other words, they would be 'shriven'.
- 4) In the United Kingdom, <u>Ireland</u>, <u>Australia</u> and <u>Canada</u>, Shrove Tuesday has another name... Pancake Day! Traditionally during Lent, Christians would give up rich, tasty foods such as butter, eggs, sugar and fat (some Christians continue to do so, in fact). Shrove Tuesday was the last chance to eat them and what better way to do so than with a delicious pancake!
- 5) In other countries, Shrove Tuesday has different names. In <u>Germany</u>, for example, it's called 'Fastnacht' (meaning 'Eve of the Fast') and in Iceland it's called 'Sprengidagur' (meaning 'Bursting Day'). In <u>France</u> and some other parts of the world, the festival is called 'Mardi Gras', from the French phrase meaning 'Fat Tuesday'.



What is Ash Wednesday?



Ash Wednesday, in the Christian church, is the first day of Lent, occurring 6 1/2 weeks before Easter (between February 4 and March 11, depending on the date of Easter). In the early Christian church, the length of the Lenten celebration varied, but eventually it began 6 weeks (42 days) before Easter. This provided only 36 days of fast (excluding Sundays). In the 7th century, 4 days were added before the first Sunday in Lent in order to establish 40 fasting days, in imitation of Jesus Christ's fast in the desert.

It was the practice in Rome, Italy, for penitents to begin their period of public penance on the first day of Lent. They were sprinkled with ashes, dressed in sackcloth, and obliged to remain apart until they were reconciled with the Christian community on Maundy Thursday, the Thursday before Easter. When these practices fell into disuse (8th–10th century), the beginning of the penitential season of Lent was symbolized by placing ashes on the heads of the entire congregation. In the modern Roman Catholic church, on Ash Wednesday the worshiper receives a cross marked on the forehead with the ashes obtained by burning the palms used on the previous year's Palm Sunday. Worship services are also held on Ash Wednesday in the Anglican, Lutheran, and some other Protestant churches. Eastern Orthodox churches begin Lent on a Monday and therefore do not observe Ash Wednesday.



Pastor's Report – Pastor Sue Notes in her report and Alan highlighted challenges during worship services without music. Mark Shue updated the council on Lucy's status. We will be needing music support for the foreseeable future. Council has received feedback and discussed in our meeting that there has been lots of positive feedback on sermons and Pastor's role in general, especially over the past few months. She is doing a great job. Installation of Council members will be on January 19, 2025.

Treasurer's Report – December was a great month financially. We took in over \$24,000 for the budget in December. The end of year/start of new year general budget balance was \$16,693.74. We spent approx. \$9,000 less than budget in 2024. Current memorial totals equal \$13,318.23. A group from the congregation including Jim Lyerly's family, Mary Trexler, Drew Cornelison, Ken Kluttz, Alan King, and Catherine Ward met with Jesse Webb (A Stitch Above Upholstery located on Oliver Rd) to look at material for new pew cushions. The material is a performance fiber that repels water and stains. Replacements will include new pew cushions/kneeling bench cushions/communion bench cushions. Total price will be \$11,000. This includes foam and fabric (\$5707.00), (\$1575) foam, labor (\$3600) a discount of (-\$391.74), and Tax (\$509.74). We have made a deposit \$5500 from memorial fund. Remaining amount due is \$5500. Memorials from Jim Lyerly, Ruth Lyerly, James Trexler, Undesignated, and a \$1000 gift from Mary Trexler will make up amount due. The congregation has previously approved pew cushion replacement as a capital expenditure and needed expense. Current estimate 6 weeks for completion (end of Feb).
