"If possible, so far as it depends on you, live peaceably with all." (Romans 12:18)

What does it mean to live peaceably? Does it mean keeping to ourselves? Not rocking the boat with coworkers or family members? Avoiding conflict by not attending family holidays and events?

I suspect Paul wrote this line to the Romans fully understanding that he was asking for the impossible from an empire that thrived on war, conflict, and takeovers. He wants them to live peaceably, but he phrases it in such a way that indicates that he knows peace isn't always possible, and sometimes it isn't up to us. It was true for the Romans in the days of Early Christianity, and it is true for us today.

We learn about the latest military conflict, and we pray for peace.

We hear about an act of domestic violence, and we pray for peace.

We see the news footage of another mass shooting, and we pray for peace.

Unless we are impacted by these events...then we want something done to bring about peace.

So what is peace? Is it merely the absence of violence or war? Is it what remains after the hatred and anger has been spent? Is the peace we pray for permanent or will it flee when the next angry voice or gunshot rings out? Is "walking on eggshells" to avoid an outburst peaceful? Is it peaceful for us to witness the bullying of others? What is peace?

The Hebrew word for peace - shalom - means fullness. It means having everything you need to be wholly and happily yourself. I wonder what it would look like if we all had everything we needed to be wholly and happily ourselves. Would we be able to then beat our swords into ploughshares, and bang a drum as an act of worship and praise instead of the beginning of a battle cry?

Fredrick Buechner writes, "for Jesus, peace seems to have meant not the absence of struggle, but the presence of love." Is recognizing that we have the love of Christ within us, the first step to feeling peace? If so, then perhaps helping others feel that love, can help them feel that peace as well. I cannot help but think that if we all felt the peace of Christ within us, we would hesitate to destroy that.

In what ways do you find peace? How do you share that peace with others?

On Sabbath and the Stewardship of Time

I hope this note finds you on vacation, just back from vacation or packing for vacation, beloved. And even if not a long, formal vacation, I hope this note finds you taking a more relaxed pace in these days where my Celtic ancestors encouraged us to spend more time outside in the "House of Light."

Many folks see summer as vacation season and rightfully so. Sabbath is not just a gift given by the Divine; it's a command. And while most folks think "Remember the sabbath day and keep it holy" means "go to church," that's actually not the commandment (though worship is certainly a part of sabbath).

The commandment is to remember that humans are not just meant to be producers and consumers; that's a capitalistic way of thinking often imposed upon God's economy. The commandment reminds us that we are worthy and worth something in this life not because we produce but because we are produced by a God who makes us worthy.

In other words, when we think of how we steward time, it's important to plan fallow time in there. Vacation. Sabbath. God has given it not just as gift but as commandment. It can be both.

So how, beloved, are you encouraging your people and yourself to steward sabbath time? And how are you connecting that to the discipleship practice of stewardship?

Remember that when we talk about stewardship only in reference to money or pocketbooks, we truly shortchange (pun intended) the discipleship life that God in Christ invites us into. Everything that has value is something to be stewarded, and certainly time has value.

Indeed, it is the least renewable resource we have as mortals.

So, beloved, I'll ask again: how are you stewarding your time in these summer months? How are you encouraging your people to steward their time as disciples, finding God in the fallow moments?

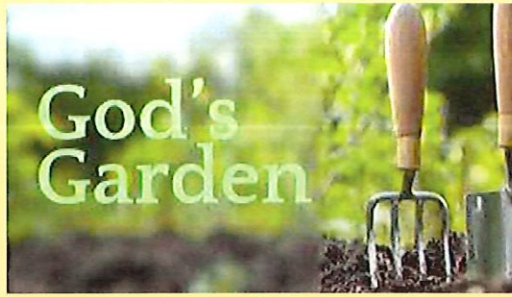

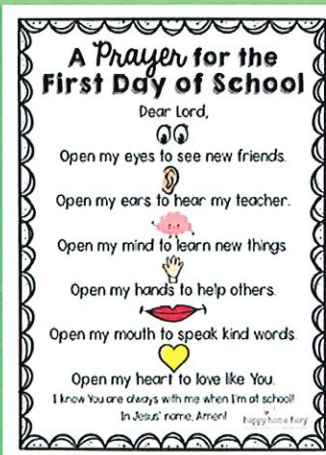
St. Peter's Preschool is ready for an exciting year with the theme "Under the Sea." Our church will once again be filled with laughter and learning from 66 students.

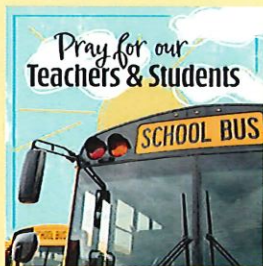




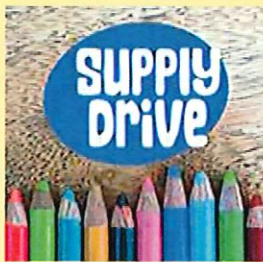

A PRAYER FOR CHILDREN GOING TO SCHOOL

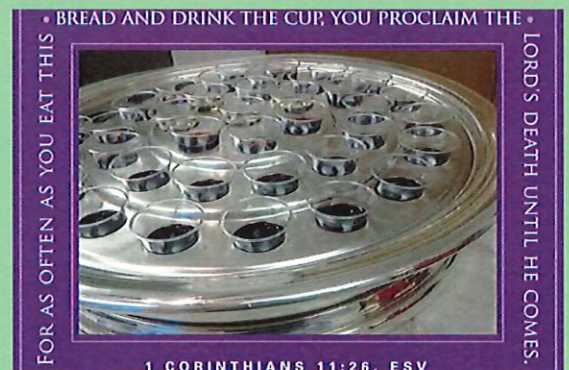

How to serve faithfully in community?

What practical steps can you take to serve faithfully in your community?

Hebrews 3:5 sets the tone: “Now Moses was faithful as a servant in all God’s house, bearing witness to what would be spoken by God in the future.” Moses models loyal, day-to-day obedience. His service was personal, practical, and public—exactly the blend needed in any modern community.

Big Idea: A Pattern of Faithful Service

God’s Word records Moses’ faithfulness so we can imitate it. The same Lord who measured Moses’ reliability now watches ours. Because Scripture is both accurate and literal, every directive stands unchanged and fully relevant.

Practical Steps for Today

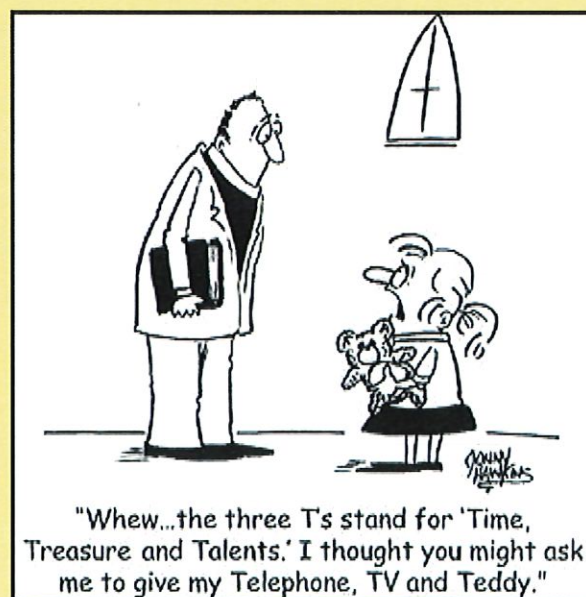
- Remember you are a steward, not an owner.
- 1 Peter 4:10: “As good stewards of the manifold grace of God, each of you should use whatever gift he has received to serve one another.”
- View time, skills, and possessions as the Lord’s property **on loan for neighborhood good**.
- Listen before acting
- Moses heard God first, then moved. Saturate your mind with Scripture and stay sensitive to quiet needs nearby.
- Start with humble tasks
- Mark 10:45: “For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve.”
- Offer to stack chairs, run errands for an elderly neighbor, or mentor a teen. Faithfulness grows in seemingly small assignments.
- Serve consistently, not sporadically
- Galatians 6:9: “Let us not grow weary in doing good, for in due time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up.”
- Schedule regular slots for community outreach just as you would any important appointment.
- Aim for quality work
- Colossians 3:23-24: “Whatever you do, work at it with your whole being... It is the Lord Christ you are serving.”
- Excellence reflects the character of the God you represent.
- Witness with both words and deeds

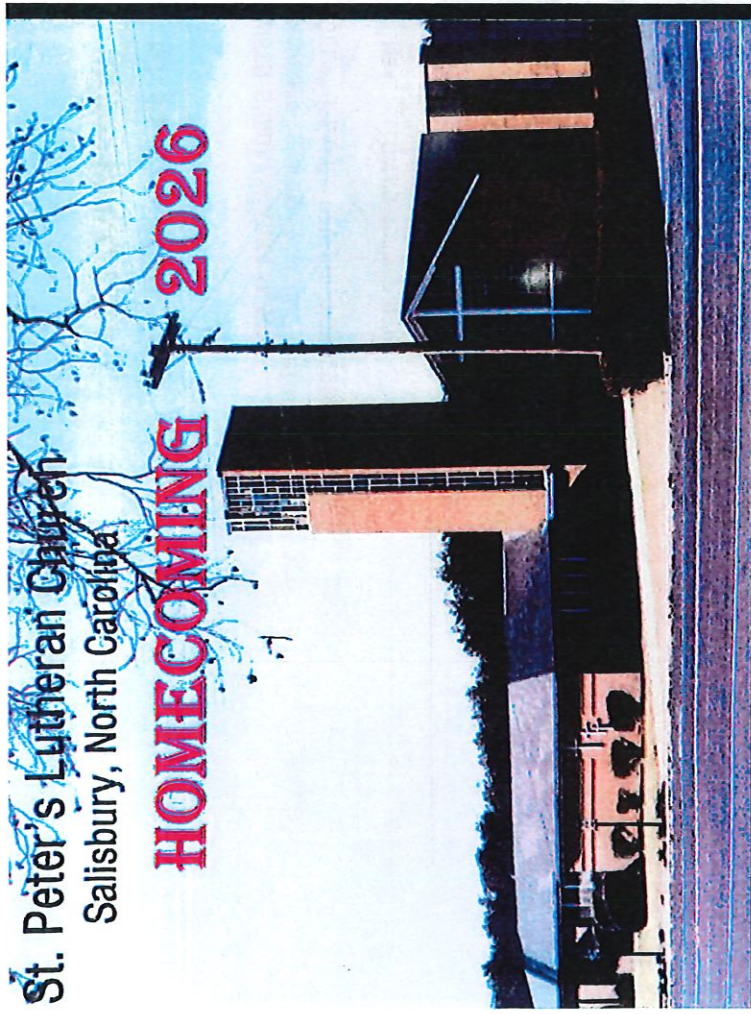
STEWARDSHIP

- Matthew 5:16: “Let your light shine before men, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Father in heaven.”
- Meet physical needs and, when welcomed, share the gospel message that motivates your service.
- Partner with other believers
- Romans 12:10-11: “Be devoted to one another... keep your spiritual fervor, serving the Lord.”
- Joining forces multiplies impact and keeps accountability high.
- Keep Christ at the center
- Philippians 2:3-4: “In humility consider others more important than yourselves.”
- Guard against self-promotion; let every act spotlight the Savior rather than the server.

Summary

Moses’ steadfast ministry echoes through Hebrews 3:5 and challenges each follower of Christ to visible, faithful engagement. By stewarding resources, embracing humble jobs, maintaining consistency, and keeping Christ foremost, anyone can mirror Moses’ legacy and bless the community with tangible displays of God’s unchanging truth. <https://biblehub.com/>





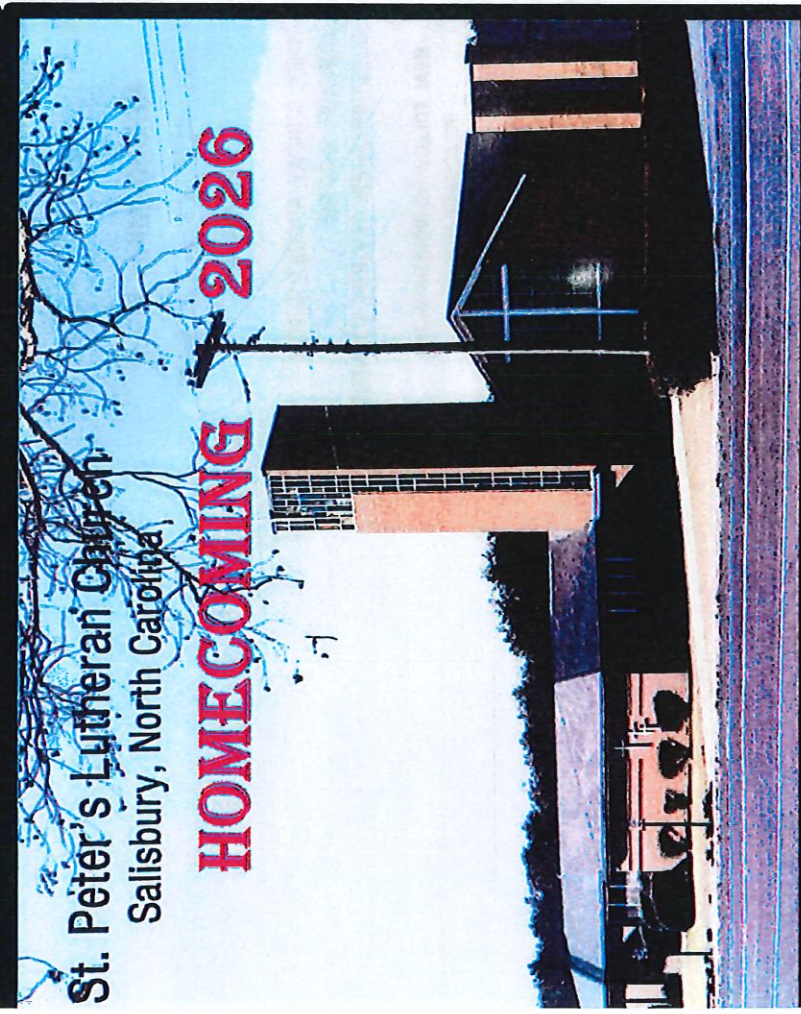

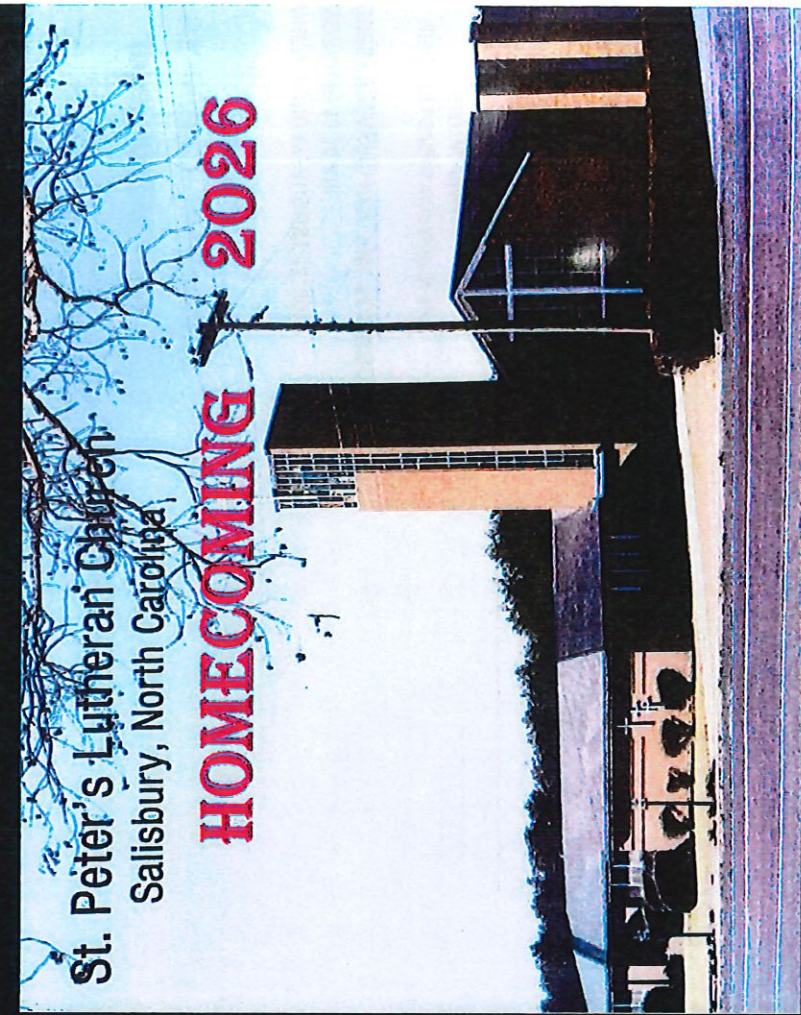

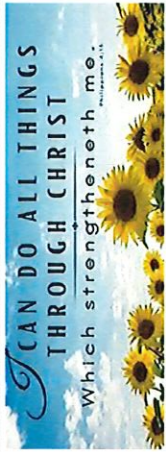
